TOWN ROADS MAKE HISTORY

At our September meeting, Thomas Mocko gave an interesting and informative talk about the development of the town road system in Willington. As a result of nine months of intensive research, Tom was able to plot the roads as they were surveyed. He made maps of each road, recording the dates. However, some roads were never recorded as having been surveyed and thus these have not been listed in his research. Tom's study covers 140 years, from 1730 to 1869. The following list includes the roads and survey dates:

1730-39: General Wolcott's Highway (Rt. 44); Ruby Road to a stretch of road which parallel's Rt. 320 to South Willington Road and then joining Cisar Road and on to Rt. 320, as we know it; a small piece of Village Hill Road running from Stafford into Willington; Jared Sparks Road.

1740-49: None.

1750-59: Balazs, Runpike, Parker, Mason, Old Farms, Commons, South Willington, Navratil, Fisher Hill, Glass Factory Schoolhouse, Kollar, Eldridge Mills, Village Hill (which connected to Eldridge Mills as one continuous road), Tinkerville, part of Moose Meadow Road as far as Jared Sparks, and Dennis Road.

1760-69: Turnpike Road, the rest of Moose Meadow Road to Turnpike, Rt. 32, Mihaliak, part of Polster, Trask, (which extended to Eldridge Mills Road), Burma Road, Cowles, Busse, Eldredge, Clint Eldridge, an unnamed road running between Trask south to Rt. 44 and another road running between Ruby Road and Trask in an east-west direction, Kechkes Road, an unnamed road running between Moose Meadow Road and Rt. 320 in an east-west direction.

1770-79: Luchon, Hancock, Lohse, Cemetery, Spak, Potter School, Liska, the rest of Polster which extended to the Stafford line.

1780-89: Krivanek, an unnamed road running off Ruby Road east to Moose Meadow.

1790-99: part of Spak Road and then unnamed road south to Rt. 32 near Ellington line.

1800-09: Seckar, Marsh, Blair, unnamed road in northeast section running north and southwest.

1810-19: Schofield, Adamec, Latham, Dennis, Lustig.

1820-29: none relevant.

1830-69: Depot, Trask extended to Rt. 44, Rt. 32 extended to Stafford line, Lohse Road extension.

Any roads not listed were either never surveyed or were built sometime after 1870.

RECOLLECTIONS OF JOHN MERRICK, the Society has the following items for sale: note paper, decorated with views of the Willington Hill Church, the Old Button Shop at Sharpes Hill Road, the Parker House, and Moose Meadow School House. We also have postcards with 12 views taken from old snapshots dating back to the late 1800's.

Also, for sale are reproductions of a Willington map dated 1869 showing the houses and names of those living in them at the time; schools and industries. These maps have been hand painted by members of the society and sell for \$2; an unpainted version is \$1.

HISTORICAL TIDBITS

A store was kept open on Willington Hill in the building now owned by Ms. Florence Dolesal. This store was also the post office until rural free delivery was established.

The first postmaster, Johnathan West,[?] was a man who had the good of his towns-people at heart; he delivered mail, often on horseback, and was instrumental in getting subscriptions for many papers and magazines. He would often loan good reading matter to those who could not afford the luxury. Mr. West^o lived in the Kline house and is presumed to be the builder of that residence.
